AFTER acknowledging, in my Slave Trade of 17th March, of this year, the receipt of the Earl of Aberdeen's Slave Trade, of 30th May, 1843, I had the honour, in my Slave Trade of 2nd June, of this year, to report to you, for the information of Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, that finding it impossible accurately to reply from private sources to the 14 queries relative to slaves in Bolivia, contained in his Lordship's Despatch above alluded to, I had been under the necessity of applying, as by copy enclosed in my Slave Trade, 17th March, to the Bolivian Minister of Foreign Affairs, then in La Paz, in order to fulfil the object desired; at the same time, in my said Slave Trade Despatch of the 2nd June, I enclosed to you a copy of the Minister's reply to my application, dated Cochabamba, 17th May, deferring the solution of the queries till the arrival of the Government in this capital.

His Excellency and the Government arrived here on the 8th June, but the Minister Mendez, having obtained leave of absence, did not join the Government till the end of July.

Since the Minister's arrival, I have taken many opportunities to remind his Grace of the queries; and after repeated solicitations, I have at last succeeded in obtaining, in an official form, accurate replies to each of the enquiries, which I now have the honour to enclose.

I hope the above remarks will exculpate me from the charge of dilatoriness in this affair.

IN reply to your esteemed note of 17th March last, No. 8, relative to the condition of slaves in this Republic, and the 14 queries which, for the information of the Government of Her Britannic Majesty, were enclosed therein, I will give you the replies which are in the reach of this Ministry, To the 1st. The population of Bolivia exceeds 1,200,000 inhabitants; but

To the 1st. The population of Bolivia exceeds 1,200,000 inhabitants; but the positive numbers cannot be determined to an accuracy, in default of the last census or register of persons paying taxes. In this population the number of slaves scarcely amounts to a thousand individuals, of both sexes, and of all denominations, mulattoes, zambos, quarterons, &c., so that the proportion of the Ethiopian caste to the rest of the population is as 1 to 1,200

To the 2nd. Instances have occurred in the last 10 years of some slaves having been imported from the province of Salta, in number not exceeding 12. The Government, by Order of 2nd February, 1843, commanded by a judicial investigation to be instituted on this subject, recommending it to the Superior Court; and the result was, that a few individuals had come with their masters in the character of servants, and not as an article of commerce, and that they were shortly declared to be free. About 40 individuals, emigrants, more or less, have come from the Empire of Brazil, the most part of them men of colour, and a few women also of colour; but these persons were not received as slaves, or as runaway negroes; and the Government has openly refused to deliver them up, as solicited by the Chargé d'Affaires of that nation.

To the 3rd. In the Republic there are no laws which establish deference between the free man and the slave in criminal cases, as regards the guarantee of his rights, or the respective aggravation of penalties; and if in civil cases any difference exits, it is more favourable than prejudicial to the slave; because, when he disputes his liberty, he enjoys the benefit of exemption from judicial fees, and possesses other concessions which are not enjoyed by free men, such as the nomination of guardians or attorneys.

nomination of guardians or attorneys. To the 4th. The reply to this question is comprehended in the second part of the former query, inasmuch as slaves can plead through the medium of guardians named by them, and they are even admitted directly to judgment; and, in that case, the law concedes to them many favours, such as changing masters, their sale with deduction of the former price, and even the right of passing to other domination, solely with the security that the new master will make over to the old one the amount of the value of their labour, calculated at the small sum of 30 dollars a year. This is the most effective protection that the Government and the law have been able to grant to those born slaves.

The 5th query is reduced to know whether the testimony of a slave is admitted before a court of justice. In criminal cases it is. As to civil cases our laws have enacted nothing in that respect; nevertheless, slaves are not prohibited to appear in quality of witnesses; and they cannot be rejected, except for the general causes, called by lawyers, fault of witnesses, (tacha de testigos,) which also apply to the free man.

To the 6th and 7th. The slave in Bolivia is well fed and treated; therefore, he enjoys robust health, and generally lives longer than the natives in warm places and valleys.

To the 8th. The slave population is on the decrease, and in a few years it will completely disappear, because, since the year 1825, the law declares all those born in the Republic to be free.

To the 9th. The manumission of slaves is generally done in the testaments of their owners, who, grateful for their services, declare them to be free; or they themselves procure freedom by their own money. More than that, the slave in Bolivia also works, acquires gain for himself, and is capable of holding property.

To the 10th. The laws and regulations of the Republic, as regards slaves, within the last 10 years, have been favourable to them; because during that time Treaties with Great Britain have been concluded for the abolition of Slave Trade; because the Government has refused the delivery of those come for asylum to the Bolivian territory from the neighbouring Empire; because the few coming from the Argentine Republic have been declared free; and because, lastly, a project of penal law is before the Senate against those who may carry on the Slave Trade, in conformity with Article IX, of the said Treaty.

To the 11th. The Government and all the nation cherish a sentiment of humanity favourable to the abolition of slavery.

As regards the 12th and 13th. No difference exists before the law between a free man, and a negro, zambo, or mulatto, nor between the coloured or white who may have been born free. Therefore, the coloured persons possess the same rights as the others, and they can be admitted to State employments.

To the 14th and last. Since the years 1829 to 1831, when a general census or register of persons paying taxes was undertaken, no other has been concluded; and the one alluded to was not exact, by reason of the obstacles encountered in a nation which had lately emerged from colonial government.


