AN ACCOUNT of all Slaves which have become the property of the Crown, by Escheat or otherwise, in the Island of *Antigua*, from the year 1820 to 1823.

SIR,

Saint John's, August 27th, 1823.

I HAVE the honour of acknowledging your Excellency's letter of the 24th instant, together with the copy of a circular from His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, requiring, in consequence of an address of the Honourable House of Commons to His Majesty, the following information; Accounts of all Slaves in the possession of His Majesty's Government in any of the Colonies; of all expenses incurred for their maintenance since January 1815, and of all Slaves which, having become the property of the Crown by escheat or otherwise, have been sold.

In compliance with Your Excellency's commands that I should transmit to your Excellency, with the least possible delay, distinct and detailed information upon these heads, I have the honour to state, that the knowledge I possess upon the subject is confined entirely to my situation of Escheator General and Casual Receiver. To this office I was appointed in the early part of the year 1820, when I was informed by the police that there were six Slaves, formerly the property of one Mary Thaxter, which had been in the possession of my predecessor in office (Mr. Thomas Norbury Kerby) as an escheat to the Crown. It was with difficulty that I could collect them; their characters were and are very bad, and they are perpetually committing some crime; when I can keep them in possession they are maintained by me as casual receiver, and provided with medical aid. They consist of two idle old men, and a woman and three sons; the eldest a very depraved young man, and the others children. Doctors Murray and Crawford have informed me that they have a demand against the casual receiver for upwards of 100*l.* Antigua currency, for the medical care of these persons in the lifetime of the late Mr. Kerby, and which I should consider myself authorized to pay out of any funds which should come into my hands in right of my office, no other arrangement ever having been made for their care and support.

On the 9th of August 1822, at a Court of Escheat, eight Slaves were found to have vested in the Crown, the former proprietors having died leaving no lawful heirs, and without having devised or otherwise disposed of their property; four of the number have continued ever since in my possession, and maintained by me; three of the number, (mulattos), their father petitioned Your Excellency to be allowed to purchase their freedom, but I understand he has been since deterred from so doing from the badness of their characters; the remaining one, making the eighth, is an old blind man, who has been taken care of by some of his friends, but to whom I consider myself accountable for his support, when called upon. No Slave which has become the property of the Crown by escheat has been sold since I held the office; and from due inquiry I am informed none in that situation have been sold since January 1815.

I HAVE the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your Lordship's circular letter of the 19th ultimo, and in reply enclose a return of all slaves escheated to the Crown from the year 1815; and to acquaint your Lordship that there are not any slaves in this colony belonging to Government, as I consider that the men of the companies of military labourers stationed here, come within the meaning and intent of the 141st article of the Mutiny Act, and are consequently free, and as such have enjoyed all the privileges appertaining unto free people from the moment of their being placed under the protection of the British Government; and that the women and children attached to them must be considered as free also.

## DOMINICA.

COPY of a Letter from the Earl of Huntingdon, to Earl Bathurst, K. G. ;  
with Three Enclosures.

MY LORD, Government House, Dominica, 20th October 1823.

IN compliance with your Lordship's circular of the 19th July, transmitting the copy of an address of the Honourable House of Commons to His Majesty, for Returns of all Slaves in the possession of His Majesty's Government in the Colonies, and expenses incurred for their maintenance, &c.

I herewith forward a return of all Negroes in charge of the Collector of the Customs at this Island, who have been forfeited to His Majesty by virtue of sundry Acts of Parliament for the abolition of the Slave Trade. In that Return are included five fugitive Slaves from the Islands of Martinique and Marie Galante, that were acquitted by the Court of Vice Admiralty, as not being confiscable, but they still remain under the protection of the collector. I also transmit an account of the expenses incurred for their maintenance and condemnation since February 1819, when they were taken charge of.

In regard to the Slaves who, having become the property of the Crown, have been sold, I transmit herewith a return from the Casual Receiver of this Island, stating there are none ; I however think it right to acquaint your Lordship, that some instances occurred previous, and one since my administration, where persons dying intestate and without any (legal) heir, their Slaves have been taken possession of by the Casual Receiver, who has administered to their effects, and the Slaves have been sold to liquidate the debts of the intestate, and the balance remaining after the settlement thereof has been accounted for by the Casual Receiver. In the case which occurred since my administration, there were three Slaves and some other little property ; the demands against the intestate's estate were 448*l.* 5*s.* 9*d.* and the Slaves and effects only produced 274*l.* 11*s.* 9*d.* which was, by my directions, divided amongst the creditors.

THE foregoing is a statement of the expenses incurred for the maintenance, clothing and medical attendance of the slaves attached to the Crown estates in this Island, from the 1st of January 1815 to the 1st August 1823.

Here will be observed in this statement a difference both in quantity and price of the salt fish and dry provisions furnished the different properties, by comparing the amount of the supply of one year with that of another; this difference, it may be proper to explain, arises from the fluctuation in the price of these articles, particularly salt fish, which varies from five to eleven dollars the hundred pounds, and from the occasional employment of tradesmen on the properties, fed with the estates provisions.

There will also be seen a difference in their amount, by comparing the several invoices from Messrs. Joseph Marryat & Son, which arises from the circumstance of blankets and other articles not being every year required.

LIVERPOOL: - - Escheated to the Crown in 1811, and sold to Alexander Gordon, for which 125 *l.* 8 *s.* currency was received.

MY LORD,

Demerara, 26th December 1823.

I HAVE the honour to transmit the information required by your Lordship's circular for the House of Commons, on the subject of such slaves as are public property in the colony under my government.

I have easily rendered the return of those slaves who are actually attached to the civil government complete in all its points, specified in the circular dispatch I had the honour to receive from your Lordship; but with regard to those slaves who were recently attached to the Quarter and Barrack department, and are now handed over to the Ordnance, as the only expenditure on their account is for clothing and food, and the former being regularly supplied to them from head quarters, I find myself unable to form a correct estimate of their cost, and am only enabled to forward a list of the articles annually supplied, and an average annual amount of the value of the rations drawn from the commissariat stores by those slaves, which will, I trust, answer the purpose required.

I transmit herewith nominal lists and descriptions of all the slaves.

COPY of a Letter from Lieutenant-Governor Beard, to Mr. Wilmot Horton ;—  
with one Enclosure.

SIR,

Berbice, 16th January 1824.

IN obedience to the Earl Bathurst's commands of the 19th July last, that I should transmit an account of all Slaves in possession of His Majesty's government in this colony, stating how many are under twenty years of age, and also an account of all expenses incurred for their maintenance, &c. I immediately applied to Mr. Walker, the crown agent, for the required information ; I, however, regret to state, that I have hitherto been unable to obtain it from him, the only document I have yet received being a list of the negroes attached to the Winkel department, which I lose no time in transmitting to you, Sir.

Mr. Walker seems to have some hesitation in making the required returns, and has generally referred to the Lords of the Treasury, to whom he says he always transmits his accounts. In the hope that Mr. Walker will put it in my power, without much further delay, to obey the Earl Bathurst's commands,

COPY of a Letter from the Duke of Manchester to Earl Bathurst, K. G.

MY LORD,

King's House, Jamaica, 13th October 1823.

I HAVE the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your Lordship's dispatch of 19th of July, marked circular, and have the honour to acquaint your Lordship that I am not aware of any Slaves in this Island now in the possession of His Majesty's Government; and with respect to Slaves which have become the property of the Crown by escheat, I have already transmitted to your Lordship a return of all Slaves escheated to the Crown since 1st January 1808, specifying the time at which the escheat took place, and the manner in which the Slaves were disposed of after final judgment for the Crown.

This return accompanied my dispatch to your Lordship of the 17th of March last\*.

## B A H A M A S.

MY LORD,

Government House, Bahamas, 5th March 1824,

IN reply to your Lordship's dispatch, dated 19th July 1823, I have the honour to acquaint your Lordship that in the Bahamas there are no Slaves in which His Majesty has an unqualified right of property. The only persons who in any degree come under this description are the Africans under indenture. I herewith transmit a return of these, together with a statement of their expense during the period alluded to, lest your Lordship's dispatch may have had reference also to them.
