\* Remarks:—Extract of a Letter from Robert Horsford, Esq. the sitting magistrate, to George Wyke, Esq. Collector of the Customs, dated 15 May 1824:—"IT appeared that Mrs. Smith had given the woman some clothes to wash for her (Mrs. Smith's) children, against the Sunday morning, which the girl had neglected to do, and had devoted her time exclusively to preparing some things for her husband, to the utter omission of the work which had been assigned her. That Mrs. Smith, naturally provoked at such neglect, had given the woman a *single box on the ear*, which was the foundation of her complaint. Mrs. Smith gave the woman a very good general character; and it appeared in evidence before me, that the African, as well as her child, had always experienced the kindest and most indulgent treatment at the hands of her mistress. Under these circumstances, I told the girl I considered her conduct to have been most ungrateful towards Mrs. Smith, the complaint as most frivolous, † and that had it not been for the general good character she bore, I certainly should have felt it my duty to *punish her*, an expression which any rational person would construe, rather as a cautionary threat, than as one intended to be carried into execution. The probability of my mentioning that species of punishment, which Miss Smith's treacherous memory will at once be refuted by my informing you, that it is my *invariable practice* to avoid inflicting *corporal* punishment upon *females of any description*; but upon misdemeanors being proved before me, that I constantly sentence them to the stocks, solitary confinement, &c. &c; and that since I have had the honour of holding His Majesty's Commission as a magistrate for this Colony, I have *only once* been compelled to have recourse to that species of punishment towards a female, and that *only* under circumstances of the highest aggravation."
