RETURN to an Address of the Honourable The House of Commons, dated 24 August 1846.

- A RETURN "of the Appropriation of all Sums of Money received as the Proceeds of Vessels or other Property condemned in the Courts of Admiralty, Vice-Admiralty, or Mixed Commission Courts, for Violations of the Laws or Treaties prohibiting the SLAVE TRADE."
- A RETURN " of all Sums of Money paid in each Year since 1807 to Captors of Vessels condemned for Violation of the Laws and Treaties prohibiting the SLAVE TRADE; distinguishing the Sums paid as Head Money, Bounty for Slaves taken, Bounty per Ton Register of Ships taken, and as Captors' Shares of the Proceeds of Ships and Property condemned."
- A RETURN "of all Sums of Money paid by the Crown to or on behalf of Captors, in Satisfaction or Indemnification of Expenses or Damages arising from the Prosecution or Seizure of Vessels alleged to be engaged in the Slave Trade; also, of Sums paid to Foreign Governments, or to British or Foreign Persons, for Losses caused by the Seizure, Destruction or Condemnation of Vessels, Barracoons, or other Property, alleged to be engaged in the Slave Trade; distinguishing, as far as possible, the Names of the Persons receiving such Compensation, the Dates of Payment, and the Nature of the Injury or Loss for which Compensation was made in each Case, from the Year 1807 to the present Time."

RETURN of the Appropriation of all Sums of Money received as the Proceeds of Vessels or other Property condemned in the Courts of Admiralty, Vice-Admiralty, or Mixed Commission Courts, for Violations of the Laws or Treaties prohibiting the SLAVE TRADE.

THE following is the Appropriation of Property seized for violation of Laws or Treaties prohibiting the Slave Trade, and condemned in the Courts of Admiralty, and Vice-Admiralty, or Courts of Mixed Commission.

By the 46th of Geo. 3, c. 52, one moiety of the proceeds in cases seized by his Majesty's ships of war was appropriated to the captors, and the other moiety to the Crown.

In cases not seized at sea, either by any officer of his Majesty's Customs or Excise, one-third part thereof was appropriated to the seizor, one-third to the Governor of the colony or plantation where the seizure was made, and the remaining one-third to the Crown.

By the Convention made between his late Majesty King George the Third and the King of Portugal, dated the 28th of July 1817, one moiety of the proceeds of the property condemned was appropriated to the British Crown, and the other moiety to the Crown of Portugal; and by the Act of the 58th of Geo. 3, c. 85, and the 1st and 2d Geo. 4, c. 99, the moiety which belonged to the British Crown was appropriated to the officers and crew of the capturing ship.

It may be proper also to observe, that by a subsequent Treaty with Portugal, dated the 3d of July 1842, and by the Act of the 6th and 7th Vict., c. 53, it is stipulated, amongst other things, that Portuguese vessels might be seized by Commanders of Her Majesty's ships duly authorized, and the moiety of the proceeds of such vessels, and their cargoes, being the proportion stipulated to belong to the British Crown, was appropriated to the captors.

By the Treaty between his late Majesty King George the Third and the King of Spain, dated the 30th of May 1820, and a subsequent Treaty entered into between his late Majesty King William the Fourth, dated the 28th of June 1835, one moiety of the proceeds of Spanish property so seized and condemned was appropriated to the British Crown, and the other moiety to the Crown of Spain; and by the Acts of the 58th Geo. 3, c. 36, the 1st and 2d Geo. 4, c. 99, and the 6th of Will. 4, c. 6, the moiety which belonged to the British Crown was appropriated to the officers and crews of the capturing ship.

By the Treaty between his late Majesty King George the Third and the King of the Netherlands, dated the 4th of May 1818, one moiety of the proceeds of the property condemned was appropriated to the British Crown, and the other moiety to the King of the Netherlands; and by the Act of the 59th Geo. 3, c. 16, and the 1st and 2d Geo. 4, c. 99, the moiety which belonged to the British Crown was appropriated to the officers and crew of the capturing ship.

By the Treaty between his late Majesty King George the Third and the Emperor of Brazil, dated the 23d of November 1826, one moiety of the proceeds of the Brazilian property condemned was appropriated to the British Crown, and the other moiety to the Emperor of the Brazils; and by the Act of the 7th and 8th of Geo. 4, c. 74, and the 1st and 2d Geo. 4, c. 99, the moiety which belonged to the British Crown was appropriated to the officers and crew of the capturing ship.

By two Conventions between his said late Majesty King George the Fourth and the King of the French, dated the 30th of November 1831 and the 22d of March 1833, one moiety of the proceeds of French property condemned was appropriated to the British Crown, and the other moiety to the King of the French; and by the Act of the 3d and 4th Will. 4, c. 72, sixty-five per cent. of the net proceeds was appropriated to the British captor upon all French ships and cargoes condemned. A subsequent Treaty was, however, entered into between Her present Majesty and the King of the French, on the 29th of May 1845, whereby the said Conventions are suspended for the period of ten years, and Her Majesty's ships of war have not now the right of seizing at sea French ships engaged in the illicit traffic.

By the Treaty between his late Majesty King William the Fourth and the King of Sardinia, dated the 8th of August 1835, sixty-five per cent. of the proceeds of the Sardinian property so condemned was appropriated to the British Crown, and the remainder to the King of Sardinia; and by the Act of the 5th and 6th Will. 4, c. 60, the sixty-five per cent. appropriated by Treaty, as due to the British Crown, was given to the British captor.

By the Treaty between his late Majesty King William the Fourth and the King of Denmark, dated the 26th of July 1834, sixty-five per cent. of the proceeds of the property condemned was appropriated to the British Crown, and the remainder to the King of Denmark; and by the Act of the 5th and 6th Will. 4, c. 61, the sixty-five per cent. appropriated by Treaty to the British Crown was given to the British captor.

By a Convention dated the 9th of June 1837, the Senates of the Free Hanseatic Cities of Lubeck, Bremen and Hamburgh acceded to the Conventions with France, dated the 30th of November 1831 and 22d of March 1833, and by the Act of the 1st and 2d Vict., c. 39, sixty-five per cent. of the net proceeds is in like manner appropriated to the British captors of Lubeck, Bremen and Hamburgh vessels,

By a Convention between Her present Majesty and his Imperial Highness the Grand Duke of Tuscany, dated the 24th of November 1837, his Imperial and Royal Highness acceded to the said Two Conventions made between this country and France, and in pursuance of which, and the Act of the 1st and 2d Vict., c. 83, sixty-five per cent. of the proceeds is in like manner appropriated to the British captors.

By a Convention between Her Majesty and the King of the Two Sicilies, dated the 14th of February 1838, his Majesty acceded to the said Two Conventions made between this country and France, and in pursuance of which, and the Act of the 1st and 2d Vict., c. 84, sixty-five per cent. of the proceeds is in like manner appropriated to the British captors.

By the Act of the 2d and 3d Vict., c. 73, authority was given to the Commanders of Her Majesty's ships, as therein mentioned, to seize Portuguese vessels engaged in the Slave Trade, and other vessels similarly engaged, and not justly entitled to claim the protection of the flag of any state or nation; and authority is thereby given to the High Court of Admiralty and all Courts of Vice-Admiralty to adjudge and condemn vessels so engaged to the Crown; and by the Act of the 5th and 6th Vict., c. 91, the whole proceeds of the sale of such vessels and their cargoes are appropriated to the captors.

It is proper, however, to state, that the Act of the 5th and 6th Vict., c. 114, repeals so much of the said Act of the 2d and 3d, as relates to Portuguese vessels.

By a Treaty concluded between Her present Majesty and the Republic of Venezuela, dated the 15th of March 1839, it was stipulated that one moiety of the proceeds of the property condemned should be appropriated to the British Crown, and the other moiety to the Republic of Venezuela; and by the Act of the 3d and 4th Vict., c. 67, the moiety granted by the Treaty to the British Crown was appropriated to the officers and crew of the capturing ship.

By Treaty between Her present Majesty and the Argentine Confederation, dated the 24th of May 1839, it was in like manner stipulated that one moiety of the proceeds of the property condemned should be appropriated to the British Crown, and the other moiety to the Argentine Confederation; and by the Act of the 5th and 6th Vict., c. 40, the moiety belonging to the British Crown was appropriated to the officers and crew of the capturing ship.

By a Convention between Her present Majesty and the Republic of Hayti, dated the 23d of December 1839, that Republic acceded to the Conventions with France, dated the 30th of November 1831 and 22d of March 1833, and by the Act of the 5th and 6th Vict., c. 41, sixty-five per cent. of the proceeds is appropriated to the British captors of Haytian vessels.

By Treaty between Her present Majesty and the Republic of Bolivia, dated the 25th of September 1840, one moiety of the proceeds of Bolivian property seized and condemned should be appropriated to the British Crown, and the other moiety to the Bolivian Republic; and by the Act of the 6th Vict., c. 14, the moiety stipulated to be paid to the British Crown was appropriated to the officers and crew of the capturing ship.

By Treaty between Her present Majesty and the Republic of Texas, dated the 16th of November 1840, it was in like manner stipulated, that one moiety of the proceeds of the property seized and condemned should be appropriated to the British Crown, and the other moiety to the Republic of Texas; and by the Act of the 6th Vict., c. 15, the moiety stipulated to be paid to the British Crown was appropriated to the officers and crew of the capturing ship.

By Treaty between Her present Majesty and the Oriental Republic of Uruguay, dated the 13th of July 1839, it was stipulated, that one moiety of the proceeds of the property seized and condemned should be appropriated to the British Crown, and the other moiety to the Oriental Republic of Uruguay; and by the Act of the 6th Vict., c. 16, the moiety stipulated to be paid to the British Crown was appropriated to the officers and crew of the capturing ship.

By Treaty between Her present Majesty and the Emperor of Austria, King of Prussia, and Emperor of all the Russias, dated the 20th of December 1841, and by the Act of the 6th and 7th Vict., c. 50, one moiety of the proceeds of Austrian, Prussian and Russian property seized and condemned is appropriated to the British Crown, and the other moiety to the officers and crew of the capturing ship.

By Treaty between Her present Majesty and the Mexican Republic, dated the 24th of February 1841, one moiety of the proceeds of the property seized and condemned is appropriated to the British Crown, and the other moiety to the Mexican Republic; and by the Act of the 6th and 7th Vict., c. 51, the moiety so stipulated to belong to the British Crown was appropriated to the officers and crew of the capturing ship.

By Treaty between Her present Majesty and the Republic of Chili, dated the 19th of January 1839, one moiety of the proceeds of the property seized and condemned was appropriated to the British Crown, and the other moiety to the Republic of Chili; and by the Act of the 6th and 7th Vict., c. 52, the moiety so stipulated to belong to the British Crown was appropriated to the officers and crew of the capturing ship.
