A RETURN "showing the Total Number of African Negroes landed for the purposes of Slavery on the Islands and on the Continent of America, from the Year 1815 to the Year 1843, both inclusive; distinguishing the Number so landed in each of those Years, and distinguishing also the Number landed in each Year on the Territory of each separate State or Power, so far as the same can be made up from Documents in the possession of Her Majesty's Government:—Also, Cases adjudged under Slave Trade Treaties, and Number of Slaves emancipated in consequence, at Sierra Leone, Rio de Janeiro, Havana, Surinam, and other Places respectively, from the Year 1829 to the Year 1844."

This Return is an Abstract of a Return (marked 73) presented to the House of Commons on the 24th February 1845, and ordered to be printed on the following day.

The reports made by British Functionaries of the arrivals of Slave Vessels in Transatlantic ports, from which the present Return is compiled, must not be considered as giving an account of all cases in which Slaves have been imported; this will appear from the following extracts from the reports in question:—Her Majesty's Commissioners and Her Majesty's Consul at Rio de Janeiro, 1st January 1844: "The accompanying Return for this year exhibits the number of vessels said to have landed cargoes to be 37; total of Slaves 14,891. The total number of Slaves, as shown by the present Return, 212.

is not one-half of the actual number successfully imported. We are assured that nearly 40,000 have been landed within these provinces in the period."—Her Majesty's Consul at Bahia, 30th July 1843: "The great secrecy with which the Slave traffic is carried on, and the facilities which this extensive coast offers for the landing of Slaves, together with the connivance and venality of the petty authorities, render it impossible to obtain a correct statement as to the number of Slaves imported, or places at which they have been landed."—Her Majesty's Consul at Pernambuco, 27th July 1839: "The List (No. 2) does not exhibit either the number of Slaves landed, or the names of the creeks and inlets in which they have been disembarked, for the utmost diligence of inquiry or vigilance of research cannot arrive at a correct knowledge of these facts, which are impenetrably veiled by the artful combination of all those who are either directly or indirectly interested in the Slave Trade."—Her Majesty's Commissioners at Havana, 1st January 1836: "Fifty Slave-vessels have safely arrived in this port during the year just expired. In 1833 there were 27 arrivals, and in 1834, 33; but 1835 presents a number of arrivals by means of which there must have been landed, at the very least, 15,000 negroes."—Her Majesty's Commissioners at Havana, 1st January 1840: "The average number of Africans introduced per annum is as well known as any other part of the statistics of the population; we have therefore the less hesitation in saying, that the average number of Africans brought here is said, and we believe it, to be about 18,000 per annum, and about 7,000 more into the other ports of the island, making a total of 25,000."—Her Majesty's Commissioners at the Havana, 1st January 1842: "We are glad to have it in our power to give a return of the vessels and cargoes that have arrived here or in the neighbourhood, including Matanzas, during the last seven years, as taken from the books kept at the store used by the Slave-dealers here as an exch
