No other accounts have been forwarded to the Treasury by the agents of the captors at the Cape of Good Hope, or any one else, and no explanation can therefore be given of the other charges which reduce these proceeds from the said sum of 345 l. 4s. 11 d. to 168 l. 14s. 11 d.; such accounts, however, are no doubt either in the custody or possession of the Registrar of the Vice-Admiralty Court at the Cape, or of the agent for the captors at that place.

The condemnation of this vessel and cargo having taken place under the Act of the 2d & 3d of Victoria, chapter 73, the captors become entitled to the whole of the proceeds; and it is only in consequence of the said sum of 168 l. 14s. 11 d. having been paid into the Commissariat chest at the Cape, as being the net proceeds, that the Lords of the Treasury acquired any knowledge whatever as to that sum being so stated, as will appear by the following document from the Deputy Commissary-General, attested by the Registrar of the Vice-Admiralty Court; viz.—

At a Court holden on Wednesday, the 14th day of January 1846, before his Honour the Worshipful Sir John Wylde, Knight, Doctor of Laws, Judge and Commissary.

Present, John Reid,

Notary Public.

Our Sovereign Lady the Queen against the barque or vessel called the "Diana," whereof Manuel Francisco da Costa is master, not justly entitled to claim the protection of the flag of any state or nation; her tackle, apparel and furniture, and the cargo laden therein, taken and seized by Richard Borough Crawford, Esquire, Commander of Her Majesty's ship "Mutine," and brought into Table Bay, Cape of Good Hope.

The certificate is continued.

In pain of parties cited not appearing, Merrington returned the monition duly executed, and referred to the affidavits of George Pechell Mends, Esquire, First Lieutenant of and belonging to Her Majesty's said ship "Mutine," heretofore exhibited and remaining in the registry of this Court.

The Judge, at his petition, having heard the said affidavits read on motion of counsel, on behalf of Her Majesty, by interlocutory decree, pronounced the said barque or vessel the "Diana," her tackle, apparel and furniture, and the cargo laden therein, to have been at the time of the seizure thereof equipped for or engaged in the slave trade, or employed in the illegal transport of negroes or others, for the purpose of consigning them to slavery; and as such to be, under and by virtue of the statute or statutes in such case made and provided, or otherwise, subject and liable to forfeiture and condemnation to our Sovereign Lady the Queen, Her heirs and successors, and condemned the same accordingly.

And further pronounced, That the said cargo should be sold, and that the said barque or vessel "Diana," not having been taken into Her Majesty's service, should be broken up and entirely demolished; and the materials thereof should be sold in separate parts, as by law in such case made and provided.
